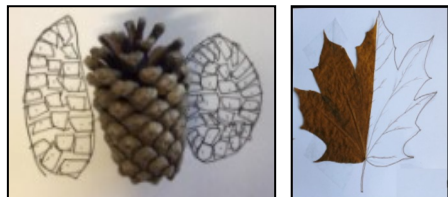
How to safely use and explore a range of materials, tools and techniques.

Skills and techniques

Drawing

Develop control in creating different types of lines (straight, curved, zig-zag, wavy, loops, spirals) with a range of media, drawing on different surfaces.

Observe and draw natural objects, looking closely to represent lines, shapes and texture.



3D Art

Manipulate clay and plasticine, experimenting with creating shapes and textures using hands and different tools.

Make a model of a natural object.

Work collaboratively to create a piece of land art using natural materials.



Vocabulary

Artwork	A piece of art, such as a painting, collage or sculpture.
Manmade objects	Things that are made by humans.
Natural objects	Things that are not manmade, but found in the world around us, such as stones, twigs, leaves, feathers and pine cones.
sculpture	A piece of solid (3D) art such as a statue, which is not flat (2D) like a painting.
Materials/mediums	The things that an artist uses to make an artwork.
Land art	A kind of sculpture made using natural materials, usually outside in a natural environment (place). Often, land art isn't permanent (does not last forever). It becomes part of the environment and is washed away by the weather. Sometimes land art is called 'earth art'.
Observational drawing	Looking closely and carefully to draw what you can see, instead of drawing from imagination.
Texture	How something feels when you touch it, for example, smooth, rough, bumpy, soft or spiky.

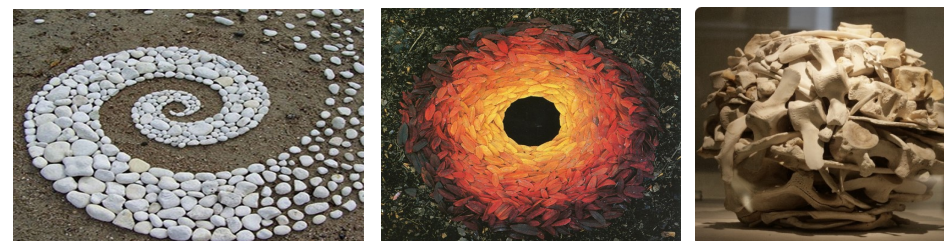
